Positioning Statement of Girl Scouts

Girl Scouts is the world's pre-eminent organization dedicated solely to girls— all girls, where in an accepting and nurturing environment, girls build character and skills for the real world. In partnership with committed adults, girls develop qualities that will serve them all their lives— like strong values, social conscience, and conviction about their own potential and self-worth.

In Girl Scouts, girls discover the fun, friendship, and power of girls together. Through the many enriching experiences provided by Girl Scouting, they grow courageous and strong.



Admission to Troops — A girl who meets or can meet membership requirements shall not be denied admission to any troop on the basis of color, ethnicity, creed, national origin, or socio-economic status.

Troops Sponsored by Religious Groups — When a Girl Scout troop is sponsored by one religious group, members of a different faith or religious affiliation within the troop shall not be required to take part in religious observance of the sponsoring group.

Control of Funds — All money raised, earned, and other assets received in the name of and for the benefit of Girl Scouting must be authorized by a Girl Scout council or Girl Scouts of the United States of America and used for the purpose of Girl Scouting. Such monies and other assets become the property of and are administered by the Girl Scout council or Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. Such assets are not the property of individuals, geographic units, or communities within a Girl Scout council.

Political and Legislative Activity — Girl Scouts of the United States of America and any council or other organization holding a Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. credential may not, nor may they authorize anyone on their behalf to, participate or intervene directly or indirectly in any political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to any candidate for public office; or participate in any legislative activity or function which contravenes the laws governing tax-exempt organizations.

Fund Raising — Adult members in their Girl Scout capacities may not solicit financial contributions for purposes other than Girl Scouting. Adults may engage in combined fund-raising efforts authorized by the Girl Scout council and in which the council is beneficiary. Girl members may not engage in any direct solicitation for money.
